NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR SUSTAINABILITY AND JUSTICE

It's a relief to have adults back in The White House. It's hard to imagine a more disturbing start to a new year than an armed insurrection incited by a sitting president and carried out by a mob that paraded the Confederate flag through the halls of Congress.

After the last four years, it should be clear just how much leadership matters. What leaders say, what they do and who they serve matters. It's exciting to have elected leaders at all levels of government who are committed to achieving an inclusive and just future for

our country rather than a future of carnage, destruction and division.

And it's not just new leadership in DC. We have four new members of the Bend City Council. We have a

new State Representative. And we have a new County Commissioner.

This new crop of leaders won't always get it right; they'll inevitably make mistakes. And the division of the last four years means that governing will remain very challenging and that the outcomes our leaders achieve will be far from perfect. But as poet Amanda Gorman said on January 20, our goal should not be "to form a union that is perfect . . . but a union with purpose." And that is what I find most exciting about this new set of leaders: they share a common purpose of a sustainable and just future.

Our job at The Environmental Center is to persistently remind our leaders of that purpose and to ensure they take meaningful action to make it a reality. We must all recommit to hold elected leaders accountable, remain attentive and engaged, and to participate in policy and budget making processes. We are doing that work in a number of ways. We're supporting bills in the legislature that will accelerate the transition of Oregon's electricity supply to 100% renewable, advance electric vehicles and modernize Oregon's reuse and recycling

laws. We're advocating for a new set of goals for the Bend City Council that will continue to prioritize a safe, walkable and bikable transportation system that serves all community members, including those who do not drive.

We're also learning how our work connects to and supports social justice. We know that our mission--to embed sustainability into daily life in Central Oregon--is inherently connected to the health, safety and wellbeing of all community members. We will continue to support local policies and actions that protect and support people of color and those who have historically been oppressed and left behind.

Our purpose remains clear: to help shape a future that's good for all people and for the planet. We are excited to keep leaning into that purpose, in partnership with leaders and our community. Thanks for joining us.

OUTDOOR CLASSROOMS CRITICAL DURING COVID-19

The Environmental Center is thrilled to award a record number of school garden grants this year — \$13,000 to 13 local schools and youth programs! The increase in funding requests confirms that local educators see garden-based education and outdoor learning as vital to students' physical and mental wellbeing, especially during the pandemic. Many educators shared that these grant-funded projects will aid in both the health and human connection that students so desperately crave right now.

4 QUICK TIPS TO REDUCE WASTE DURING THE PANDEMIC

Supporting local restaurants with takeout? Great! If you don't want them, say "no, thanks" to the single-use extras that may come with your meal. Can you use the bottle of mustard in your fridge, and the silverware in your drawers? That's the way to go.

Instead of using disposable masks, have two washable reusables: one to wash and one to wear.

Check out The Pantry (brand new shop, good for food staples) and The People's Apothecary (new ownership, good for teas and herbs): two shops in town where you can still buy in bulk.

Take the time to focus on wasted food. Buy only what you need, and use up what you buy. Did you know wasted food accounts for 8% of human-caused greenhouse gas emissions?

ELECTRIFYING CENTRAL OREGON

Electrifying transportation is an essential action to combat climate change. That's why we're excited to get to work on three Central Oregon electric mobility projects this year with support from Pacific Power and the Oregon Clean Fuels Program. These projects will help share the benefits of electrification with communities across the state. Here is a summary of our role in each of these important projects:

We are leading the charge (pun intended!) on engaging school districts and transit districts in electric bus projects and supporting the fundraising to bring local projects to life.

We are developing curriculum about electric school buses for students in the Bend- La Pine School District to complement the district's new electric bus that is coming online soon.

We are hosting a mobile EV showcase in Central Oregon later this year where community members can check out multiple electric vehicles and connect with experts.



ADVOCATING FOR CHANGE IN SALEM

Oregon's legislative session is underway and there are a number of bills related to waste, energy, climate and environmental justice that we are supporting and following. WASTE THAT'S WORTHY OF ATTENTION.

HERE ARE TWO BILLS THAT WE SUPPORT.

Right to Repair (HB 2698): If you can't repair your own things, do you really own them? In a time of planned obsolescence where stuff is made to be broken, this bill will empower repair rather than disposal by requiring manufacturers to provide us with the tools and manuals we need to fix our broken things. We support repair because it:

- reduces environmental damage by decreasing toxic e-waste;
- increases access to affordable technology; and
- supports small businesses and the local economy.

Modernizing Oregon's Recycling System (HB 2065 / SB 582): Oregon has an outdated recycling system that leads to public confusion about what can and cannot be recycled and, consequently, high rates of contamination. The system also places too large a burden on local communities for the end-of-life costs of materials. This bill would finally apply "extended producer responsibility" principles to Oregon's waste system and require producers to finance much of the cost of system improvements. This bill would also:

- require truthful, easy-to-understand recycling labels;
- develop a state-wide recyclables collection list and educational programs to increase public understanding; and
- improve recycling opportunities in rural areas by equalizing the cost of transporting recyclable materials to markets.

ENERGY & CLIMATE BILLS TO KEEP AN EYE ON

We are following several bills that will set Oregon on a path to generating 100% of its electricity from clean, renewable sources. The best elements of each bill will likely be combined into one later in the session.

We are supporting two bills that address energy and climate justice. **House Bill (HB) 2475** will allow customers with low incomes to pay less for their energy. And **HB 2842** will fund energy and air quality retrofits for the same households.

HB 2398 will allow local communities to improve their building codes. There are several other bills that will improve electric vehicle charging infrastructure throughout the state.
