I've been thinking a lot about growth lately. Growth of the Central Oregon community and growth of The Environmental Center.

Here's a startling fact: More than 127,000 people are projected to move to Central Oregon over the next twenty-five years. Whoa.

I've called Central Oregon home for nearly 23 years, and growth has been a constant. It shows up in all sorts

groups want to use our building, our long-time renters are quickly outgrowing our meeting rooms, and our staff is outgrowing the office space.

All this growth means there is a lot at stake for a sustainable future here in Central Oregon. We have some important questions to answer. Here are just a few:

- What sort of homes will we all live in? Standard homes that waste energy and are expensive to heat and cool with fossil fuels? Or radically efficient homes with roof top solar?
- How will we get around? Driving alone on slow-moving, congested roads? Or will we choose to walk, bike, take the bus, and switch to electric vehicles?
- How can we build a more inclusive sustainability movement that develops and empowers the next generation of leaders to drive meaningful, lasting change?

Our job at The Environmental Center is to work with the Central Oregon community, from kids and parents to business owners and elected officials, to shape the answers to these and other big questions. Our mission—to

embed sustainability into daily life in Central Oregon—demands it.

## LIFE-LONG LEARNERS BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Kids are constantly learning and synthesizing the world around them - building habits, relationships, and values that will hopefully last a lifetime. Our educators help to shape what they take home from each school day, emphasizing how individual actions contribute to transformative change across our communities.

Most recently, we've helped almost all elementary schools in Bend La Pine School District transition from disposable forks, knives, and spoons to reusable silverware. Cafeteria waste stations were redesigned so that students stack paper boats (trays), sort their silverware, and return whole fruit to a "No Thanks" bin. In an environment where the norm is to throw everything away, we educate and empower students to change one small behavior that makes a big difference across the district. This collaborative effort between school staff, Green Team students, and TEC educators has helped to reduce plastic waste and shift student behaviors around single-use plastics.

Better yet, we know this impact has a ripple effect. We've gathered feedback from families who are learning alongside their kids and changing behaviors at home, too. Being a 'good steward' isn't one prescribed set of actions. We're inspired to see how each student and family applies school lessons to their own lives.

## MORE FROM OUR YOUTH EDUCATION TEAM... We awarded over \$10,000 in School Garden

Grants to nine recipients, including public and private schools, an educational farm, and community-based youth organizations in Bend, Redmond, and Prineville. Head over to our blog to learn more. ## **CHANGE IN NUMBERS**

On December 4th, 2019, Bend joined the ranks of 413 communities across the U.S. and Canada with Climate Action and Sustainability Plans.

Cumulatively, these plans engage more than 70 million citizens. With this awesome power of collective action from coast to coast, we will contribute to a healthier world. We will make a difference.

Bend's Community Climate Action Plan is a set of 20 strategies and sub-actions to reduce Bend's fossil fuel use by 40% by 2030 and 70% by 2050. We know these reductions are possible - but it is going to take partners and individuals across the community working together to achieve them.

As the climate action plan moves forward, we will continue to call on the power of your collective voices. You helped us get here, but the real work is just beginning. Stay tuned for ways to participate.

**P.S.** Even though the Home Energy Score wasn't included as a mandatory action in the plan, we are committed to finding new creative ways to incentivize residential efficiency. This is one of our top priorities in 2020.

## A SOLUTION TO POLLUTION

Our Rethink Waste program received a Materials Management Grant to the tune of \$55,000!

With these funds from the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), we're launching a pilot program in partnership with Housing Works to improve recycling in multi-family complexes in Deschutes County. This grant will also allow us to offer two weeks of free Eco Hero summer camp to 10 to 13-year old students in these residences.

This new program provides solutions. Deschutes County's recently-adopted Solid Waste Management Plan includes several recommendations designed to extend the life of Knott Landfill - including an investment in recycling at multifamily facilities. This same strategy is also outlined in Bend's Community Climate Action plan as a pathway toward meeting our greenhouse gas reduction goals. We're excited to be a part of these bigger solutions that will make Central Oregon a more sustainable place to live.

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
