

THE EVOLUTION AND RESILIENCE OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL CENTER

Change and disruption have been a constant these last few years. From a racial reckoning to polarizing politics, pandemics and the shift to a hybrid workplace – to name just a few – we've experienced a lot since 2016.

A different way to frame all this change and disruption is evolution. There are many forces that have shaped The Environmental Center recently, some threats and others opportunities. They've forced us to build on our strengths, wrestle with our weaknesses, and adapt and grow to remain successful as educators and advocates for a sustainable, low-carbon future.

One way we're evolving is to serve and provide programs to the entire Central Oregon region. It's right there in our mission: to embed sustainability into daily life in Central Oregon. But the truth is, we have been mostly focused on Bend and Deschutes County to-date. With nearly half of our staff now living in Redmond, Sisters, and La Pine, we're also better equipped and more energized to build deeper relationships in these communities.

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LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CONT'D

This year, we are exploring more opportunities to reach our neighbors in Madras, Prineville, and Warm Springs. Already, our educators have begun engaging youth in Madras, and they hope to reach kids in Prineville this year, too. Our garden program just awarded school garden grants in Madras and Warm Springs (see article on next page), and we're starting to plan a tour for our Garden Educator Network in Crook County this spring. We've also started discussions with local governments and garbage and recycling companies about expanding the Rethink Waste Project beyond Deschutes County.

From an advocacy standpoint, we've started looking beyond Bend for policies that support a low-carbon future. We are actively pursuing the development of an energy plan for Deschutes County, with a focus on reducing energy use and shifting to renewables. Several of our staff are also joining teams to advocate for legislative policy changes in the current 2023 legislative session in Salem: Neil Baunsgard on decarbonizing buildings and Udara Abeysekera Bickett on waste prevention, reuse and recycling.

Another way that we're evolving is growing both leadership opportunities and support roles for staff within our organization. We recently created a new Associate Director position, with Lauren Williams in

that role. Lindsey Hardy is now the Director of our new climate solutions department, overseeing energy and waste programs. And Tim Page has stepped up into a new Development Director role, overseeing our fundraising and communications activities. Adding more support staff, such as our new Development Coordinator and Rethink Waste Coordinator, has also helped strengthen the team's effectiveness.

My leadership role is also evolving. I began a new community leadership position as a Bend City Councilor on January 4. With those new responsibilities, my role at The Environmental Center is narrowing, focusing on three "F's": finances, fundraising, and our future (via our Eco Central Capital Campaign).

No nation, community, or organization can be sustainable in the face of rapid climate and social change without evolving. The times we live in require resilience: the ability to successfully adapt to challenging experiences and circumstances. I am excited about the tenacity of The Environmental Center, as we strive to be the most effective educators and advocates we can be. Thanks so much for your support to make that possible.

WHAT'S GROWING: A GARDEN FOR EVERY SCHOOL

Our Garden for Every School program's main focus is to connect students across Central Oregon to gardens at their school or in their community, and we do this primarily through our small garden grant program.

Five years in, we have funded projects from Sunriver to Warm Springs, and most communities in between. Knowing that every community is different, we meet schools or other kinds of education facilities where they're at to fit their needs for new and/or improved learning gardens!



This year, we encouraged new schools and communities to apply, and we are pleased to be able to support projects coming from a wider geographic area. Among other projects, we'll be assisting three established learning gardens to the north (in Madras and in Warm Springs): Jefferson County Middle School's Land Lab in Madras, the Warm Springs K-8 Academy's school garden and greenhouse, and the Warm Springs Early Childhood Education Center garden.

Both the Warm Springs K-8 Academy and Warm Springs Early Childhood Education Center have gardens managed by tribal member John Brunoe, with the OSU-Extension Warm Springs office. Funds will be used from each grant to buy tables and benches to create an outdoor classroom area in the already established



garden spaces (pictured above and left), and a new pollinator garden at the HeadStart campus.

"The proposed addition of a pollinator garden area will provide colorful beauty to the garden, promote fruit/vegetable pollination, and many pollinator insect viewing opportunities. The colorful, fun, informative signs will provide learning opportunities and support garden exploration activities for all teachers, students and family members who visit the Warm Springs Early Childhood Center Garden."

LOCAL YOUTH TAKE ACTION FOR A HEALTHY PLANET

After each EarthSmart lesson that Youth Education staff present to 3rd, 4th, or 5th graders, students are encouraged to create their own weekly goal or challenge for themselves to work on. The goals they set for themselves address a sustainability issue they learned about during the lessons.

This school year, we are inspired and impressed by the creative sustainability goals that EarthSmart students have set! Some students chose to focus their goals on natural resources: reducing greenhouse gas emissions, reducing household and school food waste, understanding our food systems and how to make more sustainable food choices, and conserving water resources. One class started a recycling club after the Rethink Waste EarthSmart lesson, and they even consider ways to reuse recyclable materials before tossing them in the bin

Other students are able to work on sustainability initiatives together through their school's Green Teams, or if they're in high school, via the Green Leadership Coalition (GLC). A few examples are:

- Students at North Star Elementary and Lava Ridge Elementary have the opportunity to compost with their schools' worm bins.
- A few students at **Sisters High School** are trying to encourage their teachers, school staff, and fellow students to reduce their waste by putting up better signage about recycling, and attempting to reduce recycling and waste contamination. Students are planning to perform a waste audit and collaborating with custodial staff to determine how many trash and recycling bins are needed in the cafeteria and common areas, plus how to make the custodial staff's jobs easier!
- Two students from Summit High School are working on a Food for Our Future campaign based on Meatless Monday campaigns elsewhere. They are sharing presentations with elementary school students about how eating a vegetarian or plant-based diet is healthy for both people and the planet. They plan to meet with Nutrition Services, and will also be seeking support from GLC members and have students from all different schools sign a petition to demonstrate interest across different schools and grade levels.

Way to go, students! We can't wait to share what you accomplish next.
