

LETTER FROM THE ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR, LAUREN WILLIAMS

### YOU BELONG IN THE ENVIRONMENTAL MOVEMENT

In February 2014, I visited my sister-in-law who lived (and still lives) here in Bend. She took us hiking along the Deschutes River and skiing at Mt. Bachelor. We shared meals with her close community of friends, and she even took us to a film event called Mountainfilm on Tour at the Tower Theatre one evening. The whole weekend made me feel connected in so many ways. Not just to the special places my feet touched, but to the people.

It's no coincidence that my husband and I moved to Bend shortly after that visit. But it did surprise those closest to me when I took a job at a local environmental organization – a far departure from my career path in advertising.

I've been in Central Oregon and at The Environmental Center for 9.5 years now. I arrived at the job not with formal education in the field, but with a lot of privilege and curiosity. I remember during the interview, I was asked to share how I live a sustainable lifestyle. And to be honest, I stumbled over that response because I thought

there was likely one right answer the hiring committee wanted to hear.

I'm still trying to think more expansively and with humility about what it looks and feels like to care for the earth and the people around me. I am grateful to be surrounded by an abundance of wisdom, experience and leadership amongst the TEC team, and that which is held within the communities where we work and hope to deepen our work in the future. I am learning from peers and community members what sustainability means to them; how the environmental movement I'm now a part of is at the same time beneficial and oppressive; and what a vision for the future could be, with more leaders at the center who are on the frontlines of environmental injustices.

My parents are visiting Bend (as I write this) in town from St. Louis where I spent most of my childhood. Over pizza one evening, my dad asked me something along the lines of: If you weren't hired by The Environmental Center, do you think you'd have such strong values around caring for the environment?

This question pulled at the same thread from years ago.

Everyone I meet through my role at TEC — colleagues, interns, volunteers, students, families, community partners, leaders, activists, and others — enters this space with their own story, priorities, contributions, and questions. *Environment* and *sustainability* are in our name and mission statement, but how you draw meaning and connection from these words may be different from my own, or your parents, friends, or neighbors. At its best, this is a collective movement with shared action, accountability, and care. As a supporter, as someone who helps weave this web... I hope you feel that however you choose to engage with our mission is good, and right, and enough.

Thanks for continuing to read on about all the great work this team is up to. I wish each of you a very happy summer!

## **FUNDING AVAILABLE TO RETHINK WASTE**

The Rethink Waste Project will be accepting applications until August 1st for the last round of the year of the Community Innovation Fund (CIF). The CIF awards up to \$5,000 to community-led projects that demonstrate an effort to reduce waste in some way; for instance, through improved recycling infrastructure, composting capacity, or swapping disposable materials for reusables. This year, we've awarded funds to various projects after the first two funding rounds, which showcase a diverse range of ideas, materials, and scope.

One particular area we hope to address through the CIF is improvements occurring at multifamily residential developments—think apartment complexes,

condominium units, and other densely populated areas managed by the same entity. Whether you live in this type of housing, or are a multifamily property manager or owner, your ideas are wel-



come! If you have an idea for a project, we especially encourage you to apply for the next round.

## SOLARIZE CAMPAIGN LAUNCHES THIS FALL



#### ONE MORE REASON TO BE THANKFUL FOR A SUNNY DAY!

This summer, The Environmental Center is collaborating with Energize Bend, a partner organization that is working with a group of volunteers to launch a community-led Solarize campaign. The Solarize concept, originally developed in Oregon, has become popular nationwide and is a proven model for increasing solar participation. We will work with dedicated volunteers to simplify the process and reduce the cost of going solar by providing education and installation services in one place.

This campaign aligns with strategies in the City of Bend's Climate Action Plan and the Envision Bend Action Plan. Both plans highlight the importance of connecting more people with the benefits of solar as a key strategy. In addition to residential rooftop solar, we will assist residents without good solar roof access to join the Oregon Community Solar Program, which allows participants to invest in large-scale off-site solar projects and receive the benefits on their utility bill. In conjunction with our free Home Energy Assessment program, we are developing interest-free loans and hope to make a limited number of loans available for this campaign for households with low to moderate incomes. Our goal is to expand the solar conversation and resources so that more Central Oregonians can be represented in clean energy opportunities.

The Solarize campaign will launch mid-August and you will have the opportunity to receive the group discount by signing up for a free assessment by the end of October.
