

UNITED IN AGENCY AND ACTION

As I write, the 2024 presidential election looms and climate change is not getting the attention it deserves. One presidential candidate is clearly a climate change denier. He will, no question, accelerate the already rapid pace of global warming. While the other candidate will be much better, it's not clear she'll take the steps scientists say are needed to avoid massive overheating and its dire consequences for human communities and the rest of creation that shares our world.

Yikes. I try hard not to get swallowed whole by the seeming cascade of bad news and to just give up. But what's a person to do?

The first step is to let these three facts sink in: climate change is here, it's not going away any time soon, and there is no place to hide anymore. Just ask our fellow Americans who recently moved from Florida to western North Carolina to escape coastal storms, only to be deluged by a hurricane in their new mountain homes. Or those who moved north to Central Oregon, only to be forced inside by increasingly hotter and smokier

summers. Or the Europeans, South Americans and Africans who experienced record heat, floods and drought this year.

I like to remind myself that when I give up my agency by disengaging, I am also giving up my ability to make a difference. I am giving power to the players and forces who don't care about the seventh generation, those who care only about what's-in-it-for-metoday. No matter the outcome on election day, we can still make a difference by taking action in our local communities.

We can take individual action in our daily lives, actions that TEC works hard to make more feasible for more people. Waste less food, reuse more. Walk, ride a bike and take the bus more often. Buy or lease an electric vehicle. Improve the energy efficiency of your home and go solar—and take full advantage of the incentives that support those actions.

We can also keep calling on our local and state elected leaders to do what they can, in their sphere of influence. They should be adopting policies that both reduce emissions and help us adapt to a hotter, drier, and stormy future. And they should make sure to center the needs of those most impacted by climate change.

Our work at The Environmental Center is grounded in the importance of grassroots action, in the idea that what we do here matters and will help drive the change needed in Salem, in Washington DC and globally. You see that in our growing focus on reuse. You see it in our new home energy assessment program that helps lower income households and people of color access resources to invest in reducing their emissions and energy bills and adapting to hotter, smokier summers. You see it in our advocacy for policy in Bend that lowers emissions from natural gas. You see it in our work to develop the next generation of leaders. And you see it in the commitment of our staff to our mission and community.

Regardless of the outcome, I know we'll get through this election season together. Above all, personal agency and grassroots action will remain key strategies central to a cooler and more equitable future. Thanks for helping The Environmental Center do its part to build that future.

RETHINK WASTE GETS A BOOST WITH NEW STAFF

As the Rethink Waste Project program has grown over the years, the need for at least two program staff to manage the program's expanding reach and scope has become abundantly clear. This fall, we welcomed Naomi Serio as our new part-time Rethink Waste Coordinator, and she has jumped in head-first to take on some key components of the program: reusable dishware rentals, Repair Café (coming up on November 20!), and plenty of outreach opportunities across Central Oregon.

Naomi is excited to dive into her role just in time for the holiday season, where she hopes to work with all of you to make a meaningful impact on reducing waste starting with introducing reusable dishware for all your gatherings! Borrowing dishware kits is free. ROOTED IN PARTNERSHIP: PART II

Our dream of building a Learning Garden in Redmond is finally taking shape! In late September, Garden for Every School Program Manger Denise Rowcroft joined the team at RootedHomes to kick off the groundbreaking at their first Redmond development, Rooted at 19th. From the outset of planning this project, we have been in collaboration with RootedHomes to develop an on-site community learning garden that will be accessed by school children and community members alike. Much like our now 14-year-old Kansas Avenue Learning Garden in Bend, we're developing this garden for use as an outdoor classroom by a nearby elementary school, Hugh Hartman, as well as a field trip destination for other Redmond schools, without requiring teachers to use their free time maintaining the garden space. This garden will also be accessible to residents, and will be managed in a cooperative, collaborative way so that all parties benefit from the learning garden space.

We'll be working with community members and local students to get design input for the bilingual garden space, with infrastructure and development slated to begin spring 2025, when applications open for the homes. We hope to plant our first batch of garlic next fall! As with our current learning garden, we will be inviting the community to join us for regular ongoing garden work parties. If you've been wanting to join our "Happy Hour in the Garden" volunteer work series at the Kansas Avenue Learning Garden in Bend but haven't been able to make it because you live or work in Redmond, this is your chance! In addition to donations to fund this garden project, we'll also be looking for support in various other ways. If you have skills and experiences to offer, such as in-kind donations, garden expertise, building experience, event organizing, community outreach, bilingual garden signage/support and more, please get in touch!

HEA PROGRAM NOW OFFERING ZERO-INTEREST LOANS

Back when we launched our Home Energy Assessment (HEA) program, we were hopeful that a key component to the program would include access to interest-free loans for upgrades that didn't fall under the "no-cost" category. As of this fall, we have received our first gift to launch a Zero-Interest Loan option for households who are participating in the HEA program. The vision for this component is to have a community-funded pool to draw from that assists clean energy projects in getting over the finish line. This funding will allow residents in Central Oregon to access benefits including energy savings and healthier indoor air quality. We are partnering with a non-profit based in Corvallis, OR, Seeds for the Sol, to replicate their successful community-funded loan program that has been operating for 10 years. The first \$100,000 that they received has supported more than \$800,000 work of renewable energy and energy efficiency projects installed by local contractors!

Community members can sign up for the free HEA program at envirocenter.org/hea and we will let participants know when the loan program is ready to go! The first round of applications will be limited to available funding but we hope to continue growing the loan pool to make clean energy more accessible than ever before.

Our HEA Program Manager, Satya, has been doing fantastic work since the program launched, completing around 50 assessments to date and counting!

Free assessments take place in the comfort of your home, with a full

energy performance and costs.

What's in a Name?

The discussion was earnest, and the decision would be consequential. The issue before us, the Natural Resource Center board of directors: was it time for the NRC to adopt the "E" word? Would changing its name to the Central Oregon Environmental Center help to define the organization and move *environmentalism* forward? Or would it bring down conflict and hostility?

Today, 35 years later, it's a no brainer. The Environmental Center is a respected community leader and a recognized force for positive change! But let me tell you that 35 years ago the answer was not as obvious as it seems today. Timber Wars were raging in the Pacific Northwest; the friction over spotted owls and old growth forests bred deep animosity, and being an environmentalist wasn't a piece of cake. I believe the decision to become an Environmental Center helped shift the "E" word into a positive light, and helped to re-define environmentalism, moving it from 'conflict' to 'caring'. What's more, there was an issue of complete name confusion. You had: NRDC, the Natural Resource Defense Council; ONRC, the Oregon Natural Resource Council; NRC, the Natural Resource Center. Acronym chaos. Nobody could keep them straight.

In all, it was time for a forward-facing name change, and the result has been beyond our starry-eyed dreams.
